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Brief Biography

Jan Ljungberg is born 19 June 1956. He has a Master in Computational Linguistics (1984), a multi disciplinary education including Computer Science, Linguistics, and Informatics, and a PhD in Informatics (1997), both from Göteborg University. In May 2002 he became associate professor in Informatics at Göteborg University, and in June 2005 he became full professor. After finishing his PhD, in autumn 1997, Ljungberg took part in starting the Viktoria institute, where he is leading the Knowledge Management research group since 1999 (now the group is affiliated to both Viktoria institute and the department of Informatics). The group is conducting research on issues regarding knowledge, organizations and informatics, cultural anthropology and sociology. Ljungberg is since 2002 head of research and doctoral studies at the Informatics department at Göteborg University. Current research interests include Knowledge Management, Storytelling and Narratives, Open Source, and IT & Organizational Forms.

Academic leadership

After finishing my PhD, in autumn 1997, I took part in starting the Viktoria institute, where I was leading the Knowledge Management research group (KM Hub) between 1999 and 2004 (the group is now truly distributed). The group conducted research on issues regarding knowledge, organizations and information technology and consisted of people from several disciplines, e.g. informatics, cultural anthropology and sociology.

Between 2000 and 2003 I was vice head of department at the department of Informatics, Göteborg University.

Between 2002 and 2003 I was engaged as scientific leader (part time) at department of Business and Informatics at Borås University College.

Between July 2003 and 2005 I was head of the doctoral program at the department of Informatics, Göteborg University. This means responsibility for a PhD-program with 35 PhD-students and the examination of all PhD-theses. 11 dissertations have took place during this period.

From November 2006 I am vice dean at the IT-University in Göteborg, with responsibility for the PhD-program including PhD-students in Informatics and Applied Information Technology.
